Meeting called to order by Greg Drewiske @ 11:02 CDT.

2. ANTI-TRUST STATEMENT – GREG DREWISKE

Greg Drewiske reviewed the Antitrust Statement.

3. <u>REVIEW/APPROVAL OF 2017 ANNUAL FULL COMMITTEE MEETING</u> <u>MINUTES – MARK ZAWADZKI</u>

Minutes from the 2017 Annual Full Committee Meeting were reviewed. Mark Zawadzki moved that the minutes be approved and it was seconded. The minutes were approved.

4. <u>2017 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE INTERIM MEETING HIGHLIGHTS REPORT –</u> <u>MARK ZAWADZKI</u>

Highlights from the 2017 Executive Committee Interim Meeting were reviewed by Mark Zawadzki.

5. STANDING SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS

a. Membership Update – Roly Roberge

Would like to take 5 minutes at the 2018 conference to clean up the membership list.

At the annual meeting last June (2017), 57 people attended the Full Committee meeting.

Papers are published in IEEE Explorer Periodicals – IAS Magazine and Transactions. It is important for academics to get papers published – not so much for others.

Reminder that papers submitted to be published cannot be the same as the paper submitted for the conference – changes need to be made. Chris can help with the changes. If no changes then cannot be published.

e. Publicity Update – Rich Turner

Rich Turner is submitting an article to the IAS magazine about past 2017 Tacoma PPFIC conference. Working on publicity for the next conference in Appleton.

f. PPIC Awards Nominations – Rory Johnson

One award nomination is in progress and to be submitted for meritorious award. Still looking for other nominations.

Rory has an active list of names that have been mentioned in the past – Rory is reviewing that list and might be contacting others for feedback.

g. Webmaster - Greg Drewiske for Nehad El-Sherif

Pete Famighetti mentioned that Appleton website is in progress.

6. LIAISON UPDATES

a. IEEE – IAS Executive Committee Update - Dave Durocher

Steve Coppinger is now PID chair. Went through IAS nominations – Blake Lloyd was nominated for Chair, Travel Awards and Events Standing Committee (2018-2019).

Dave Durocher is Chair, Constitution & Bylaws/Nominations Standing Committee (2018).

Blake Lloyd and Dave Durocher from PPIC are on the 2018 IAS Board.

IEEE held election. Dave Durocher won Division II Director. Division II includes 6 Societies including IAS. 2 years as Director Elect starting in 2018 and 2 years as Director.

b. TAPPI Update – Burt Judson

Short Course presented in Tacoma Conference is the only activity.

Bob Vanlieshout and Duncan Rhodes organized the tutorial. 26 attended the tutorial plus the presenters. Good showing. Tutorial was profitable after expenses – profit was split between TAPPI and IEEE.

One discussion was not having the ability to video record the tutorial. If we do the tutorial again will have to try harder to record the tutorial.

Overall very successful.





c. IEEE Standards Update - Chris Heron

PPIC does not have a Standing Standards Subcommittee – therefore cannot sponsor Standards until we do. Mark Zawadzki, Greg Drewiske and Todd Legette are tasked with defining applicable standards for the pulp and paper industry. Once applicable standards for pulp and paper are defined we can get feedback on whether we pursue developing them.

PCIC will sponsor the DC Motor Repair Standard.

During the next PPFIC conference we will determine if we work towards developing standards in our committee. Dennis Neitzel commented that standards fall under the TSSC Committee in PPIC. Chris responded that to develop standards it must be a specific standards committee – TSSC is not adequate. Mark Zawadzki commented that those on the standards committee can still be members of other committees.

Dave Durocher commented that Daleep Mohla is a member of the IEEE Standards Board and wants to help.

d. Electrical Safety Workshop – Dennis Neitzel

Good workshop in Reno. Next workshop will be held in Fort Worth, TX at the Omni Hotel on March 19 - 23, 2018 – it is the latest and greatest place to go for electrical safety. There will be papers and tutorials on the 2018 NFPA. 2018 NFPA is now out – good place to figure out what the updates are. Encourage all to come.

Greg Drewiske seconded Dennis's comments – great conference.

7. OPERATING SUBCOMMITTEE REPORTS

a. PCEMC; Process Control, Engineering, Maintenance, Construction – Mike Tribe

Interim Meeting held on October 12. 14 total members. 6 members and 1 visitor on call.

3 A, 4 D and 3 E papers – 3 solid papers

b. DCS; Drives and Control Systems Subcommittee – Steve Pittman

Subcommittee interim meeting was held September 27.

Subcommittee has 50 members. Attendance: 12 members, 2 excused absences, 26 unexcused absences, and 5 guests. Total 17 in attendance.

2 A, 4 B and 2 C papers and 1 Tutorial

c. PDS; Power Distribution Systems Subcommittee - Craig Wester (absent from call)

Subcommittee interim meeting was held on September 29.

Subcommittee has 30 members. Attendance: 12 members, 10 excused absences, 8 unexcused absences, and 5 guests. Total 17 in attendance.

4 A and 7 B papers – one paper might transition to a panel.

d. TSSC; Training, Standards, Safety & Codes Subcommittee - Nehad El-Sherif

Subcommittee interim meeting was held September 12.

Subcommittee has 7 members. Attendance: 3 members, 0 excused absences, 4 unexcused absences, and 0 guests. Total 3 in attendance.





3 B and 1 C paper, 1 tutorial and 2 panels

8. AUSTIN CONFERENCE REPORT – GREG DREWISKE

Made around \$38K. Conference is officially closed out and behind us.

9. TACOMA CONFERENCE REPORT – DUNCAN RHODES & RORY JOHNSON

TAPPI tutorial made around \$3750. This was split 50/50 between TAPPI and IEEE.

Done with Financials. Sent preliminary spreadsheet to IEEE. Duncan Rhodes shows around \$33K in checkbook after \$10K payback. Income and cash flow shows a discrepancy – \$33K versus around \$24K – IEEE will need to figure it out.

Calculating 22% margin using \$24K profit number – IEEE target is 20%.

Per Rory we had 40 mill people and 12 consultants. Trending same as we have in the past. Good feedback on conference. Will look for more detail about the conference from survey results.

10. FUTURE CONFERENCES

a. 2018 Appleton – Duncan Rhodes

Duncan Rhodes and Scott Valinski are co-chairs.

Have \$10K seed money, deposit slips and checkbook. Hotel is nailed down. Conference is well on the way. Lambeau is out as the Conference Closing Session.

Duncan asked if preference for EAA (Experimental Air Association) or tour Lambeau field with dinner across the street at the brewery. Down side of EAA is we just did Boeing and went to EAA last time we were in Appleton. Send Duncan an email with your preference (vote) – duncanrhodes@ieee.org.

No pricing yet for EAA – it's a wash distance wise between the two choices. The local committee is meeting later today to nail down rest of committee and address other miscellaneous details. Conference is June 17 - 22, 2018.

b. 2019 Jacksonville, FL – Rich Butler and Walt Simpson

On track. RFP is being finalized and will be out in October. Target to finalize bids by 12/31/2017. One feedback that was received is that to look at the 4th week in June as well as the traditional 3rd week. Using the same RFP that was used for Tacoma and Appleton. Looking at Jacksonville and surrounding area including St. Augustine.

c. 2020 and Forward - Rich Butler

After Jacksonville looking at the New England area – Portland or Boston. Have not been there in a while and want to be rotating by region where there is a high density of pulp and paper industry. Nothing yet locked down.

For 2021 looking to go back to the west coast – maybe Vancouver or Portland, then Mid-Atlantic area.

Send Rich any ideas or conference leader suggestions.





11. APPLETON CONFERENCE TECHNICAL REPORT- TODD LEGETTE

Appleton Conference – 33 papers, 3 panels, 2 tutorials

In 2018, looking at doing daily unusual failures instead of one in one larger group at the end of the conference.

Reminder to the Subcommittee Chairs about milestones for paper submission including when rough drafts are due.

12. OLD BUSINESS

a. James A. Rooks Memorial Contributions Status Update – Dave Durocher

The James A. Rooks Memorial Grant Fund – Duncan Rhodes mentioned that Appleton can put money in the budget for the fund from the conference but Dave Durocher said that is probably not necessary. Believe that the fund at this time is sustainable long-term – can sustain 4 Rooks Student Interns and 4 Young Engineering Professionals per conference.

b. Rooks Student Intern & Young Engineering Professionals - Greg Drewiske

Two Interns were present for the 2017 Tacoma Conference:

- Chris Wall Pratt Industries, Conyers, GA
- Brock Kocyan Georgia-Pacific, Halsey, OR

Final cost for the 2017 program was approximately \$1927. With Brock being local, that helped with overall costs this year.

Overall, we stayed within the \$2000/person provided. Our long-term average cost is approximately \$1580 per person.

Recommendations for 2018:

• The Local Committee should provide two double rooms in Appleton as has been done in the past.

We need to get the word out and try to fill all four spots in 2018. The sooner we can get the interns identified, the lower our costs will be.

Responses to the follow-up survey of the interns below:

- Thank you for a wonderful experience at this year's IEEE Pulp and Paper conference. I hope to attend a conference in the near future, if not next year, the year after.
- I would like to thank you and everyone involved with the Rooks foundation that allowed me to come out and attend the conference. It was a great experience that I'm very appreciative for. I see a lot of benefit in attending these annual conferences, and I hope that after I speak with the Pratt E&I department that we will be able to start attending every year.

This was the fourth year we organized a program specifically aimed at attracting young engineers working in the industry to the conference. We had a couple of persons apply, but not be able to attend due to scheduling conflicts. Emily Held, part of our initial group in 2014, returned as the Power Point Operator for the conference.





Two Young Engineering Professionals attended the 2017 Tacoma Conference:

- Andrew Huff International Paper, Springfield, OR
- Michael Meza EasyPower, Tualatin, OR

Final cost for the 2017 program was approximately \$2685.

From the feedback survey:

Liked Most:

- The people. Getting to network was a great thing.
- The opportunity to network with other professionals in the industry and finding people who can help solve issues we are having at our mill.

Liked Least:

- The location -- Seattle would have been better.
- Some of the papers seemed very similar in topic. I recall more than one paper on arc flash. It would be nice to have a better variety in topics.

What could be improved?

- Getting an older member of the conference to do a somewhat of a mentor program.
- Having more young professionals attend the conference. I understand that is a goal you are already trying to achieve and the Young Engineering Professionals Program definitely helps

Did this change your view on the Industry?

- Yes, this changed my view a good amount. Coming from an outside discipline, I gained a lot of respect for the variance of what goes on in a paper mill.
- It made me feel more comfortable in the industry knowing all the resources I have available through IEEE

Other:

- Thank you for the opportunity to attend the conference. It was a really good learning experience for me and I'm hoping to attend again in the future.
- The Boeing Museum was really interesting and a great way to wrap up the week.
- I look forward to the many upcoming opportunities with IEEE.

c. Conference Survey – Greg Drewiske

Greg reported that the Tacoma conference received positive feedback. Survey report is 67 pages.

36 responses in 2017 – historical low. Historical is approximately 70 to 90. Is it an awareness issue?

89% satisfied with survey – higher than normal. Normal high around 81%.

Asked about topics – too much? Too little? Response is that want more mill applications. Tutorials on short side.

Hotel internet was not acceptable. Need to make sure that internet is acceptable in hotels for future conferences.





Duncan Rhodes responded – okay but don't know how to test.

Room block was a concern. Ran out of King Beds in Tacoma. We do not specify number of King beds, just price in the room block. Rory Johnson asked how many rooms should be blocked for Saturday and Sunday nights. Was a problem on Thursday as exceeded our room block for Thursday and availability was an issue.

Attrition – had approximately 1100 rooms but had 450 to 550 rooms attrition. We need to keep track of attrition – we do not get credit for attrition. We did not quite make the room block but they waived it. Prefer to error on the side of not losing money but if too few and hotel is busy then rooms could be an issue. Hotel said high attrition is common – maybe some rooms were double booked?

Duncan Rhodes stated that we need to track how many rooms we actually use.

13. NEW BUSINESS

a. Future Date Survey

Future Conference Survey results are included in Appendix G of this report.

Greg got the registration list from Pete Famighetti and Survey Monkey generated survey was sent to the attendees. Received 98 responses.

Start day – Stay the same (Sunday night start). Second was Monday night start.

3rd week of June – not a huge impact on future attendance - 25% less likely to go if on Father's day.

If we were to move the conference week, the responses favored the second week of June.

Solicited conflicts with other events. Dennis Neitzel indicated that ASSE conference is usually 1st or 2nd week of June.

To change the start day or move week – response was that it really does not matter. Fairly even split. If wanted a 2 day tutorial could not do it with a Monday start day.

b. Long Range Planning – John Kay

New Ad Hoc committee – approximately a year old; replaces the Sustainability Ad Hoc Committee.

Reviewing feedback from past chairs, conference attendees and first time attendees. Will provide formal feedback to the executive committee. Also will have suggested changes to the local committee planning guide.

New committee members; added one this week and looking for 1 - 2 more. Not a lot of work – approximately one conference call per quarter. If interested contact John Kay.

Mark Zawadzki asked about marketing options – social media and other options. Going after wood products has not been too successful up to this point.

c. Forming a Standards Committee within PPIC – Chris Heron

Will be gaging interest in June meeting - need to have our ducks in a row if will commit to doing this.





d. Future Conference Media (Cd's Removable Drives, Downloads) - Greg Drewiske

Example – some computers no longer have cd players. Some use USB flash drives but some companies block the use of USB flash drives. What about downloads? – looking at options including printed CD and FTP download for 2018. PCIC no longer uses media. IAS will try to standardize.

John Kay will take to Steve Coppinger and will bring back up to IAS - common question.

Dave Durocher stated that at IAS annual meeting had a mobile app written by a student. Was a trial and worked great – can load or look at papers from app.

Mark Zawadzki recommended that for 2018 we go with printed CD & FTP. Pete Famighetti is in the loop – will let attendees know attendees can download from FTP – will need the email and passcode from conference registration to download. Will solicit feedback after the conference. Always need paper for PPFIC – some conferences have options for paper many don't.

Dave Durocher stated that if we do FTP we should circle back to IEEE for FTP service (Dave Durocher to help) – ok if we do on our own but need to be careful with copyrights, etc. IEEE aims to make dollars from papers. Mark Zawadzki mentioned that searchability of the papers is important.

Greg Drewiske stated that it is an ongoing discussion until we work it out long-term – will print for foreseeable future.

e. Extend Unusual Failure Slot

Greg Drewiske stated that options are to have unusual failures on Monday and Wednesday and maybe other slots. No other comments on slots.

Dave Durocher recommended that we advertise early – gives people time to put together the material. If we have in an early slot might have trouble with quality – perhaps advertise early – week or two before the conference – filter mill people to bring stuff along.

Mark Zawadzki asked if there was harm in trying the new format.

Todd Legette – perhaps we would have more than what we have time for. We should start asking on Sunday.

f. Other

(DCS Committee) Appendix A – Classification and Schedule of Papers

The criteria for paper classification are as follow:

Class A: Paper has a sponsor, a committed author, an abstract, and a rough draft in hand, ready for review.

- Class B: Paper has a sponsor, a committed author, and abstract in hand.
- Class C: Paper has a sponsor and a committed author.
- Class D: Paper has a sponsor and an identified author.
- Class E: Paper has a sponsor.

Sponsors should make sure that the sub-committee chairmen get a copy of the author's data sheets and a copy of the Abstract. Reviewers should check the official guide to make sure that their role is understood. It is the responsibility of the reviewer to check the paper's accuracy, not to be the editor. The guide is available on the website. It is important that the sponsor not only coordinates the reviews of the paper, but also checks the presentation itself to make sure it conforms to IEEE guidelines, especially in the area of avoiding any commercialism (including company logos on template except for title page). Since the presentations are all in PowerPoint, they can be easily sent from the author to the sponsor or placed on the Pulp and Paper FTP site. It is a requirement that all authors / presenters register for the Conference, even if it is for only one day. This is also true for New Product Presenters.

(DCS Committee) Appendix B - Anti-Trust Policy

IEEE's policy prohibits any discussion which constitutes or implies an agreement or tacit understanding concerning:

- prices, discount, or terms or conditions of sale;
- profits, profit margins, or cost data;
- market shares, sales territories, or markets;
- allocation of customers, markets or territories
- discriminatory licensing provisions;
- standards or certification programs that unreasonably restrain trade;
- selection, rejection, or termination of customers or supplier;
- restricting territory or markets in which a company may resell products;
- restricting the customers to whom a company may sell;
- bidding or refraining bidding; or
- any matter which restricts a participant's independence in setting prices, establishing production and sales levels, choosing the markets in which the member operates and selects its customers and suppliers.

The principal provisions of the Sherman antitrust laws of the United States provide:

Every contract, combination in the form of trust or otherwise, or conspiracy, in restraint of trade or commerce among the several States, or with foreign nations, is declared to be illegal. Every person who shall make any contract or engage in any combination of conspiracy hereby declared to be illegal shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and, on conviction thereof, shall be punished by fine not exceeding \$10,000,000 if a corporation, or, if any other person, \$350,000, or by imprisonment not exceeding three years, or by both said punishments, in the discretion of the court.




2017 IEEE PPFIC FUTURE CONFERENCE SURVEY












5. Given the choice between changing the conference dates or changing how the week is scheduled:




6. If Tutorials were held on Friday, my attendance:
