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IEEE-Madison Upcoming Meetings

Madison Section -- Scott Olsen is planning a virtual meeting tentatively for April 29, noon central time, regarding Productivity in Building Construction. So far, he has lined up three speakers on the topic, one from each coast, and one from local construction firm, Findorff.

LMAG -- is working to schedule a talk on helping to fund and find volunteers for STEM activities to be given by Tom Zinnen. It will be virtual with the date and time not yet set.

Section Social -- Members have expressed interest in trying to connect socially, like we have done before and after in-person Section Meetings. The IEEE-Madison Executive Committee will be working to roll out a new monthly meeting dedicated to helping foster the person-to-person contact while still virtual. Tentatively dubbed "Friday Afternoon Club", it is a work in progress, but it will be implemented with a new model that allows breakout groups to get together and discuss topics of interest. Unfortunately neither WebEx nor Zoom as licensed by the IEEE-Madison allow this, so other virtual meetings platforms are being considered. One possible platform is jitsi (What is Jitsi?) We might even consider plugging in live music or video using a service like Jamulus (see Jamulus.io) or OBS (Open Broadcast Software). Have any ideas? In the media there's a lot of finger pointing over the Texas 'whiteout'. Everybody likes a punching bag! But it's been great to have knowledgeable IEEE colleagues to talk with about the details of what really happened and what are reasonable adaptations to climate change. Like searching for a lost child in the woods, evolving technology depends on searches done by many people. That's where IEEE excels, connecting experts - and us with each other.
